

### **Computer Storage and Back up for Photographers**

If you are lucky enough to have all of your photos fit on your internal drive, then they will get backed up for free—with your regular back up. You knew there had to be a catch, didn't you?

First you need to choose where to store: local or cloud. Then, there are two approaches for backing up your whole system: use the software that came with your computer, or add software and manage it yourself. Let's look at the options:

#### A. Where to store: external hard drive or cloud?

1. To use an **external** hard drive, be sure to check the size of your internal hard drive so that you choose a backup drive large enough to hold at least one copy of your internal drive. Hard drives are relatively inexpensive and their storage capacity is increasing all the time; compare features and prices. Most hard drives are easy to set up; just plug it in and your photos can be copied from the internal drive to the external drive.

Advantages: External hard drives can be moved from one computer to another in very little time (handy for those who use a desktop and laptop). It is also easy to expand your photo collection with external drives—just get another one and plug it in.

**Disadvantages:** Hard drives are free standing units, which means they can get bumped and knocked off the desk or shelf. They can also be lost in a fire or other natural disaster.

2. To use the **cloud**, first choose a cloud vendor. The cloud is part of some of subscription backup services or can be subscribed to directly (e.g. iCloud). When selecting a cloud vendor there are similar concerns as for an external hard drive (size, cost). Another factor would be rights' issues dictated by the cloud provider—do they have rights to your photos if you upload them to their cloud?

**Advantages:** The cloud is is accessible over the internet, making it very convenient. The cloud provider maintains the hardware.

**Disadvantages:** Cloud storage is not inexpensive and storing to the cloud is notoriously slow. Importantly, there is no guarantee that the cloud provider will stay in business; they don't owe you anything!

- **B. How** to store: built-in or additional software? Features to look for when choosing software for your back up:
- 1. **Bootable**—do you need a clone or bootable back up, in other words, do you want to back up your system software as well as your photos so that you can get back to work almost instantly after crashes?

- 2. Price/cost—be sure to check monthly as well as annual costs.
- 3. Ease of use—the back up process needs to be easy to set up, and easy to retrieve from when necessary.
- 4. **Performance**—usually how fast, or slow, it performs with the data transfer from the internal drive to the external storage location.
- 5. Portability or accessibility—can you access your back up photos from other computers or mobile devices?

#### Built-in software:

- TimeMachine (Mac): free, not bootable
- **Backup and Restore** (Windows 7): free, bootable on same computer
- **File History** (Windows 8 and later): free, similar to TimeMachine, not bootable

#### Additional software:

• **SuperDuper!** (Mac): \$27.95, bootable, built-in scheduler, complements TimeMachine

# **Editor's Corner Backyard Nature Hints**

hen called upon at the last minute, our own *John Avera* stepped in to judge last month's **Backyard Nature** competition. Bravely, John also appeared before us and personally delivered his critique, which I felt was very thoughtful. Before John began, he gave us a little insight to what he looked for in a nature image, and he's certainly shot a lot of beautiful photos! I think his comments apply to both regulation *PSA* images and to our more casual "backyard" variety. Here is what I wrote down from John's suggestions for a winning image:

- shoot something furry;
- something furry doing something is better;
- if you can't find something furry, find something with feathers;
- a thing with feathers doing something is better;
- flowers are nice, but they don't do anything, so the image needs to be spectacular;
- flowers are best shot with a diffuser (a translucent screen) to block direct light and also a reflector to help open up the shadows;
- when submitting any nature image for competition, always research and try to use the Latin name.

Even though my images didn't win, I found John's comments were helpful and gave me something to think about the next time I'm shooting or working on post-processing.

Not only do we have many talented photographers in our club, but I love when people are willing to share their experience and expertise with the rest of us.
