

Image Sharpening Using High-Pass Filtering

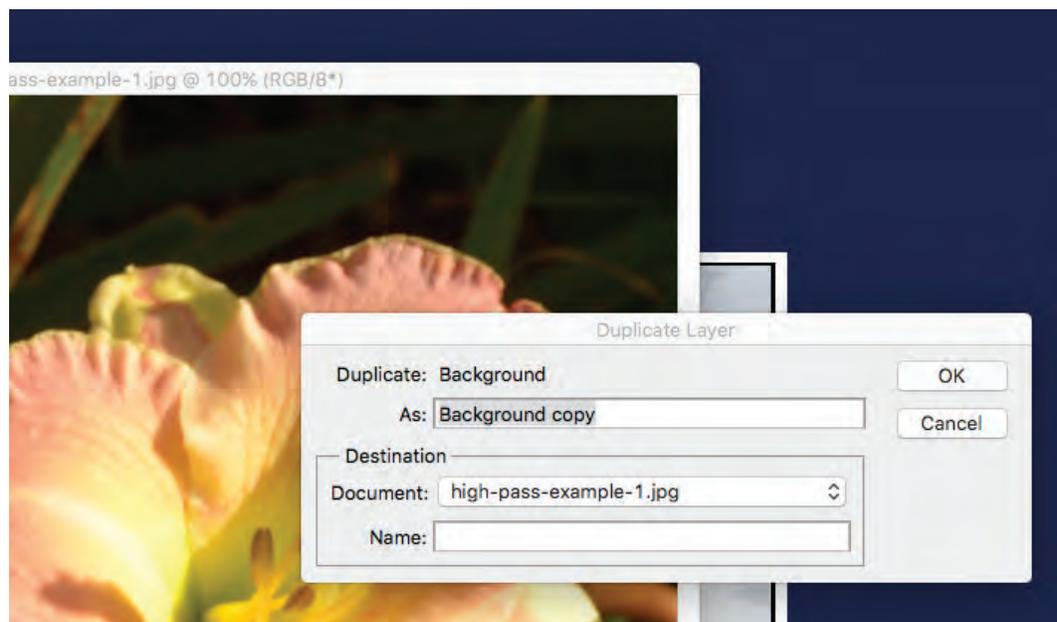
In a pleasant twist to conventional Open Projector night's fare on June 1, 2016, Brooks Leffler shared an on-screen demonstration of how to use overlay mode in Photoshop with High-Pass filtering on an images' background layer to achieve subtle sharpening beyond the capability of standard sharpening tools. 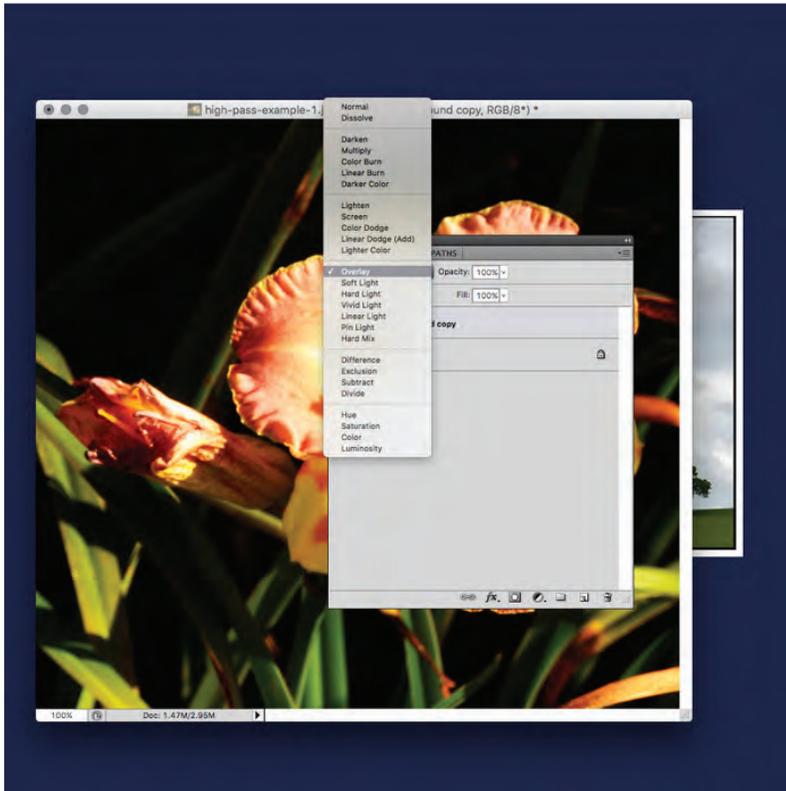
Here's a quick example:



1. Open the image in Photoshop

2. Create a **background copy** layer

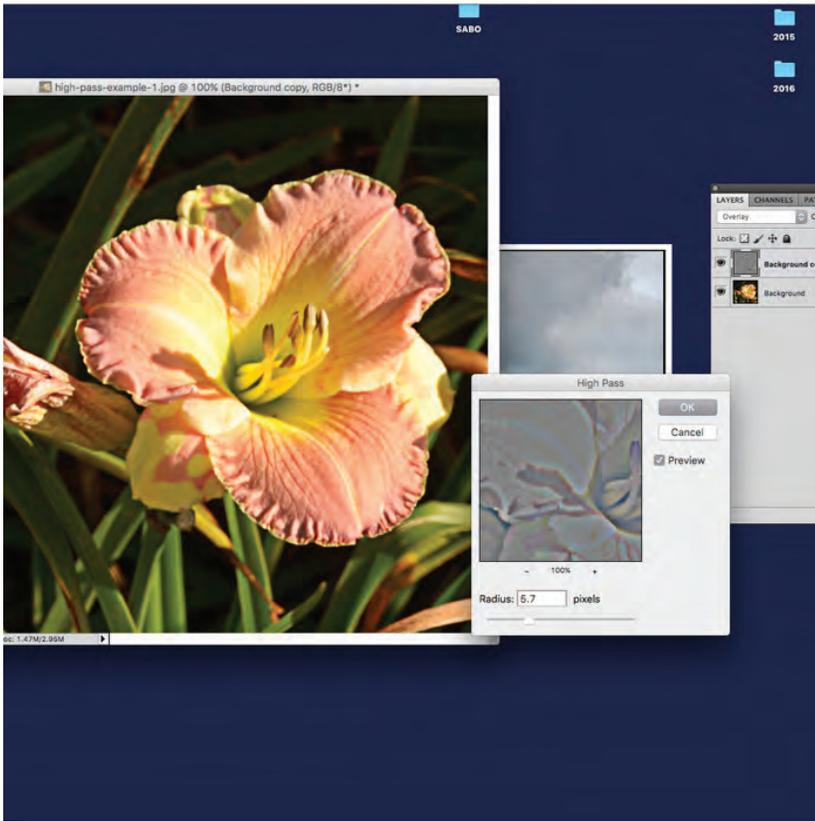




3. Select the **background copy layer** and then set **Mode** to “Overlay” (the default is “Normal”)

4. With the background copy layer selected, **in the menu bar** select **Filter > Other > High Pass**.





5. Adjust the radius slider and preview for the desired results.

6. When you like what you see, save the .psd file for future work and then save the image as a flattened .jpeg.
