It is the center of attention and it is too close to the border. Try shifting the entire image to the right. Remember, the side images don't need to be the same size. They can be narrower. They are just complementary images. This would look better as a panorama. ***

Here you have 2 candidates for the main image, the Empire State Building and the church. My suggestion is to choose one and then show the environment around them. Right now, you have 3 images of tall buildings but they don't talk to each other. The group is not harmonious and there is no flow across the panels. Two of the images have a blue sky while the last one has a white sky. The position of the church doesn't agree with the more vertical orientation of the other two images. Image3 is well exposed but the other two have blowout glass. And please, drop the background, it is way too distracting. **

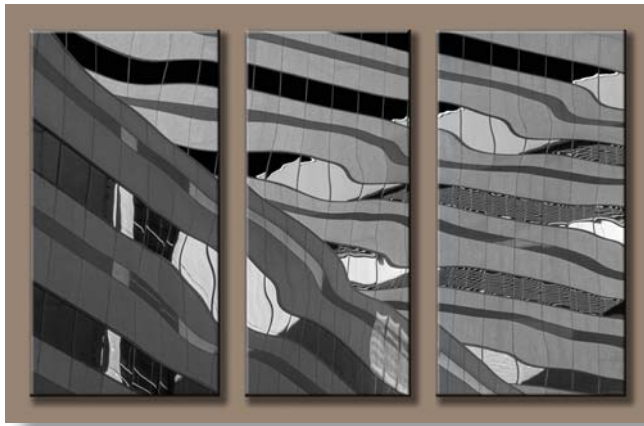


03 - Cobblestone Florist.jpg

That brown hanging tag in the image at the center does not need to be there. This image would look better as a whole image. The cuts are blocking the flow.

This is a fantastic abstract, great tones. One issue I have is on panel n. 3 (counting from left to right). It is the bright element at the top-right. I understand it is a continuation of the reflection that starts at the about the middle of the central panel and goes up to the top of panel 3. The problem is that it encourages my eyes to escape. If you burn it a little bit, it would be enough to prevent that.

The idea is interesting. I really like the color combination. This triptych has potential. I don't like the panel arrangement. My suggestion is to rotate the purple flower to have it in portrait mode and make it the same height as the yellow ones. Then it might look better to swap the yellow ones so you don't have the purple flower surrounded by dark a background. Also, see if you can find another shot of the purple flower without being cut.

These look like image transfers on wood. I also like the texture on the wall. The panels have a harmonious consistent look. I can see the flow from top to bottom and the story you want to tell. It is a "before-during-after" kind of story. I can see that in the "after" image the bird did catch something. My suggestion is to replace the "after" image with a better catch. Nicely done.

This triptych explores movement and there is a nice flow across the panels. It is kind of heavy on the right side. Those harsh reflections that otherwise would be very distracting work well here preventing my eyes from escaping. There is some color contamination on panel 3 and little on panel 2. I'm not sure if there are things floating or those are specular highlight that the camera cannot deal with.

This kind of lack of attention to detail can disqualify your image in photo competitions. Instead of cutting horizontally, I would cut it vertically and have narrow panels that would flow in the same direction as the water.

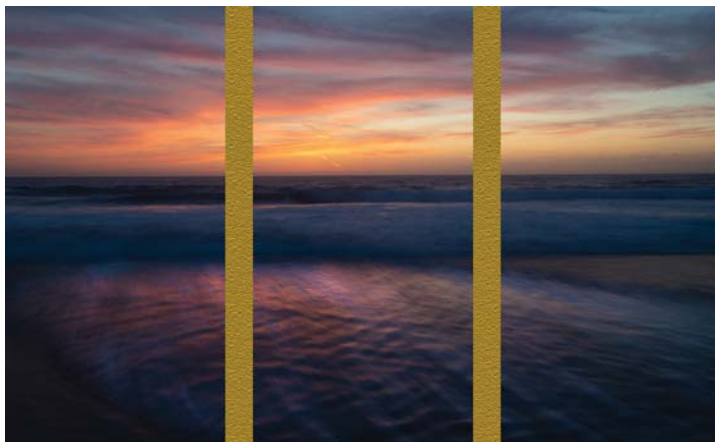
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11 - Spinning.jpg

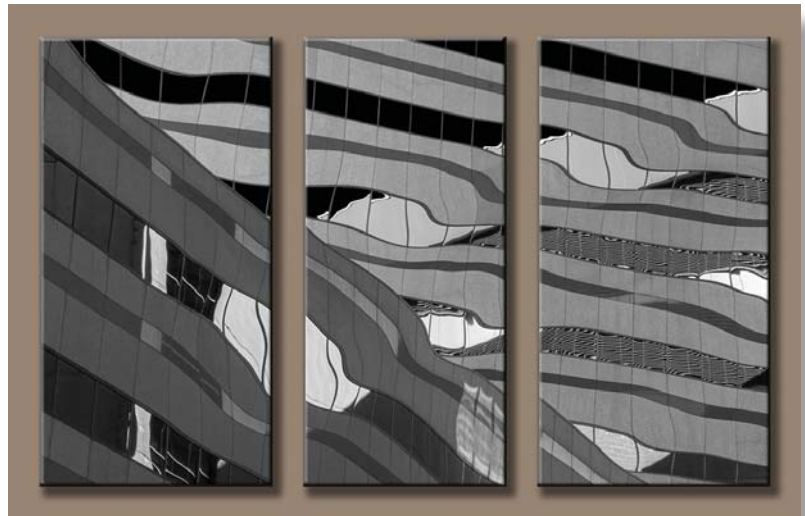

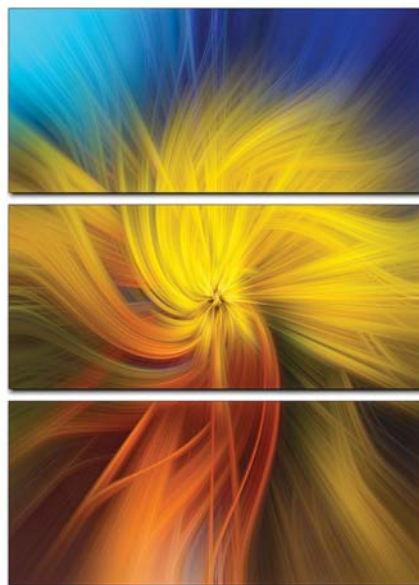
